## 2025 Results Show Excellence Taking Root in Communities

The atmosphere was electric with elation and pride. The radiant joy on the faces of parents, families, teachers, government officials, and sponsors reflected a powerful sense of unity and shared achievement. Ululations, thunderous applause, and jubilant cheers filled the room, drawing everyone into a moment that celebrated not only success, but possibility.



As the infectious smile and boundless energy of the Programme Director, Ms. Tshego Moagi, animated the gathering, anticipation surged. You could feel the collective heartbeat of learners, parents, and guests alike each pulse echoing the significance of the occasion.

More than 900,000 candidates wrote the 2025 National Senior Certificate (NSC) examinations across approximately 6,000 examination centres nationwide. From among them, the Top Achievers

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distinguished themselves through exceptional performance, surpassing expectations and setting new benchmarks of excellence.

This was announced by the Minister of Basic Education, Ms Siviwe Gwarube, during the official release of the 2025 NSC Matric results on Monday, 12 January 2026, in Johannesburg.

In her address, Minister Gwarube reflected on the Department’s ongoing efforts to transform South Africa’s education system, drawing inspiration from one of the country’s most enduring symbols—the baobab tree.

“No tree grows tall when its roots are weak, and no education system transforms a nation when its foundations are fragile,” the Minister said. “The baobab does not grow quickly or rush skyward. It first grows downward, pushing its roots deep into difficult soil, surviving droughts and storms. Only later does it rise offering shelter, nourishment, relief, and stability for generations.”

For decades, the Minister noted, South Africa rightly prioritised expanding access to education. “That work was necessary and just. But access without quality is not equality, and progression without mastery is not opportunity,” she emphasised.

Encouragingly, more than 66% of Bachelor passes in 2025 were achieved by learners from no-fee schools, with an increasing number of these schools attaining pass rates between 80% and 100%. Acknowledging this remarkable achievement, Minister Gwarube commended learners from no-fee schools for their perseverance and commitment.

“You have shown resilience—not only in these examinations, but across years of learning in a country that has asked much of you,” she said. “South Africa sees you. You have demonstrated that talent exists everywhere, and that when we strengthen the roots, hope becomes an outcome, not merely a slogan”.

Provincial results further reflected strong national performance. KwaZulu-Natal recorded the highest NSC pass rate at 90.6%, followed by the Free State at 89.33%, Gauteng at 89.0%, and the North West at 88.49%. The Western Cape achieved 88.20%, the Northern Cape 87.79%, Mpumalanga 86.55%, Limpopo 86.15%, and the Eastern Cape 84.17%. “Nationally, the NSC pass rate stands at 88%, representing an increase of approximately 0.7% from 2024,” Minister Gwarube announced.

Among the dignitaries in attendance at the release of the NSC results was the Acting Chief Executive Officer of the National Student Financial Aid Scheme (NSFAS), Mr Waseem Carrim, underscoring NSFAS’s continued commitment to supporting access to higher education for qualifying students across the country.
